- **5. Engagement of Priests and Religious:** Priests and religious should play a central role in the education of our students and the leadership of our Catholic schools.

Because of our diocesan commitment to these principles, the Catholic schools of our diocese are strong and fruitful, thriving centers of the Christian life, forming generations of students for lives of holiness and excellence. We should be proud of our schools and grateful for the sacrifices and leadership that has made them thrive. We can see their fruit in the priests, religious, and faithful Catholics of the Diocese of Lincoln, who are earnestly striving to glorify the Lord through the holiness of their lives.

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

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Education in Action

In a Catholic school, when it is living out its mission and identity, children not only learn the doctrines of the Catholic faith, but are introduced to Jesus as a living Person. This only happens when everyone at the school – from parents to custodians, teachers to office staff – is on the same page. It only happens when the Catholic identity is explicit in every way and the mission of sharing the Good News of the Gospel is incorporated into every class, every sporting event, indeed, every event that takes place within the school walls. In other words, teaching and living out the Faith can't be something relegated to Religion class.

This goal of evangelization, of forming disciples of Jesus, flows from and back to explicit catechesis, the teaching of the faith. They both can organically exist and deepen in the setting of Catholic school. If this environment is saturated with the Father's love, if each person is growing in his or her own personal relationship with Jesus, and if the school is unabashedly Catholic, grace will flow.

What an incredible opportunity it is to have a captive audience for 8 hours a day, 9 months of the year to foster this relationship between our Lord and the children entrusted to our care. Catholic education has an important role in the evangelization and renewal of our culture – it starts in our homes and continues in our schools.





Making an Eternal Impact

"Father, I just had to tell you this story. This morning at breakfast, I walked in and saw Katie eating at the table by herself and there were several pieces of cereal sitting next to her bowl. I told her, 'Just be sure to clean up your mess when you're done.' She replied, 'Ok, Mom, I will, but that's not a mess. Fr. Kaup told us during Mass at school that we can invite Jesus to eat with us, and since I'm eating by myself today, I did that. So this is my cereal and that's Jesus' and I'm just sitting here talking to him.'"

This family had entered the Catholic Church a few weeks prior, led there because they enrolled this little first grader in our Catholic school. This is the impact of Catholic education and is just one small snapshot of its power to form disciples of Jesus Christ.

Funding Catholic schools in the Diocese of Lincoln has always been and remains a dynamic partnership between parishes, families, and generous supporters. We show our commitment to Catholic education by working together to ensure that tuition is affordable for all families, knowing that our schools produce much fruit for the future of our Diocese and the Catholic Church at large.

Over the past 3 years, average tuition has been increased in Diocese of Lincoln Catholic schools to accommodate for the rising cost of education per student. Though our funding model has changed ever-so-slightly, our tuition remains extremely affordable when compared to national Catholic school averages. The increase in tuition also relieves some burden from parishes that generously work to fund schools and allows schools to compensate teachers competitively.

The Good Shepherd Scholarship Fund exists to provide tuition assistance to Catholic school families most in need across the Diocese of Lincoln.

Families with more than 3 students enrolled or those whose income falls within 225% of the Federal Poverty Level can receive scholarships. The Good Shepherd Scholarship Fund is a key element in ensuring that the Lincoln Diocese maintains its longstanding commitment to excellent, faithful, and affordable Catholic education for all students, regardless of their family's ability to pay tuition.
